Safari History - 52 years!

Many of the major events on our sporting calendar have a colourful history dating back to before most of us can remember and in this regard, the Southern Safari is no exception. Changing dates, sponsorship, organisers, clubs, etc, make it particularly difficult to establish a definite trend or starting point.

Since its inception in 1964, the Southern Safari has been the corner stone in rallying history in Tasmania. The inaugural event was organised with the Volkswagen Club of Southern Tasmania and was directed by our very own Lin Gigney. Commencing at 2pm, with an expected finish at around 4am next day, the 100% mapped navigational event ran from Hobart city, out to Runnymede, Tunbridge and return.


From 1970, the 500 Car Club jointly organised the Safari with the Volkswagon Club until 1973 when the 500 Car Club took the reigns and the rest is history.

Sponsors were plenty in the 70's with huge prize monies awarded to the winner. Even in the late sixties, the clubs were offing upward of \$200 for first place. Over the years, the event has seen major sponsorship from Jean Scene, Selleys, Island State Credit Union and in the later years, Subaru.

Even though open trials were conducted during similar months in the preceding years, it is logical to commence this event with the inception of the Tasmanian Rally Championship in 1964. In fact, that year the Championship comprised the A.G.E. Trial Routes Car Club—now the Motor Sport Club Tasmania (MSCT); Shell Around Tasmania Trial (500 CCT); Alpine Rally (LCCT); Coastal Businessman's Trial (NWCC); Southern Safari (VWCCST) and the 12 Hour Trial (500 CCT).

As was the case many times during the early years of state series competition, the latter events decided the eventual winners of the Championship. The 1964 12 Hour trial was rather a low key event attracting 6 entries who each paid a 30 shilling entry fee. Commencing from Salamanca Place at 8pm, the route encompassed the Channel district prior to moving over through Colebrook, Bothwell and Ouse before concluding at Dysart after 6 sections. The shortest section being 10 minutes and the longest 4 1/2 hours. Ray Long and Don Reid won the event and secured the Championship after being in third spot prior to that event.
